Thresher (SSN 593), for which we remember those lost on Eternal Patrol, and how this tragic incident changed the way we do submarining going forward. Fast

forward to 2025; it was barely 30 days ago that Shipmates from across the Western Region gathered in Long Beach for the Western Region Roundup hosted by the LA/Pasadena Base with the coordination of WRR Standing Committee members: WD5 Barry Wyatt (Chair/GCB), WD4 Jim DeMott (Vice Chair/Bremerton Base), Mike Swanson (Treasurer/LA Pasadena Base), Mike O'Brien (Secretary/Dolphin Base), Mike Cosgrove (Contract Negotiator/San Diego Base), Ed McCarthy (Webmaster extraordinaire/GCB) and a host of others whose names would easily fill the first page of the newsletter. Lodging and dining aboard the Queen Mary, we engaged in the camaraderie afforded by our Creed, received information and training on improving base operations, writing better awards, and community engagement, and meeting new and reconnecting with shipmates. 
Hello Ladies,

USS Pickerel (SS-177)

Lost on April 3, 1943 with the loss of 74 officers and men, while on her 7th war patrol. She was lost off Honshu. The exact cause of her loss has never been determined, but her OP area contained numerous minefields.





USS Grenadier (SS-210)

Lost on April 22, 1943 near Penang, with no immediate loss of life. She was on her 6th war patrol. While stalking a convoy, she was spotted by a plane and dove. While passing 130 feet, the planted a bomb causing severe damage. She was lodged on the bottom 270 feet and the crew spent hours fighting fires and flooding. When she surfaced, she had no propulsion and was





attacked by another plane. While she shot down the plane. When enemy ships arrived, the CO abandoned ship and scuttled the boat. Of the 76 crew members taken prisoner, 72 survived the war.

USS Gudgeon (SS-211)

Was probably lost on April 18, 1944 with the loss of 79 men SE of Iwo Jima, but may have been sunk on May 12, 1944 in another attack on an unidentified submarine and heard by several other submarines in the area. Winner of 5 Presidential Unit Citations, Gudgeon was on her 12th war patrol and most likely due to a combined air and surface antisubmarine attack. Gudgeon was the first US submarine to go on patrol from Pearl Harbor after the Japanese attack.





USS Snook (SS-279)

Lost on April 8, 1945 with the loss of 84 officers and men. Snook ranks 10th in total Japanese tonnage sunk and is tied for 9th in the number of ships sunk. She was lost near Hainan Island, possibly sunk by a Japanese submarine.





USS Thresher (SSN-593)

Lost on April 10, 1963 with the loss of 112 crew members and 17 civilian technicians during deep-diving exercises. 15 minutes after reaching test depth, she communicated with USS Skylark that she was having problems. Skylark heard noises "like air rushing into an air tank" - then, silence. Rescue ship Recovery (ASR-43) subsequently recovered bits of





debris, including gloves and bits of internal insulation. Photographs taken by Trieste proved that the submarine had broken up, taking all hands on board to their deaths in 1,400 fathoms of water, some 220 miles east of Boston.





in 1960 and was discharged in 1965. He qualified on the USS Baya AGSS-318 in 1961 and also served on the USS Seafox SS-402.


After the Navy Regy attended College of San Mateo (AA), University

Featured Boat

USS Spikefish (SS/AGSS-404), a Balao-

class submarine, was a ship of the United States Navy, named for the spikefish. She was the first United States submarine to record 10,000 dives.

World War II Service

Spikefish was laid down on 29 January 1944 by the Portsmouth Navy Yard in Kittery, Maine; launched on 26 April 1944, sponsored by Mrs. Harvey W. Moore, and commissioned on 30 June 1944.

She outfitted there until 31 July when she moved to the Portsmouth-New London area for training. The submarine departed Portsmouth on 16 September and proceeded via the Panama Canal to the Hawaiian Islands. Upon arriving at Pearl Harbor on 23 October, she began preparation for her first war patrol.



SS-404

Spikefish got underway on 15 November 1944 for the Kuril Islands and the Sea of Okhotsk. She encountered no enemy shipping during the patrol which ended at Midway Island on 1 January 1945. On

26 January, she sailed for the Ryukyus and began patrolling westward of that group.

On 24 February, the submarine made a submerged attack on a convoy of six cargo ships with four escorts. She fired six torpedoes at two of the freighters, three of which were heard to hit, but results were not observed as *Spikefish* was forced to go deep and weather out a four-hour attack of about 80 depth charges. She sighted another convoy on 5 March and expended six torpedoes in a fruitless attack which led to another pounding by escorts.

Featured Boat

Spikefish was ordered to terminate her patrol on 6 March, and she returned to Pearl Harbor on 19 March. One month later, Spikefish, under Cdr. Robert R. Managhan, sailed with Dragonet (SS-293) for Guam, topped off with fuel, and proceeded independently, on 3 May, toward an area off the east coast of Formosa where she assumed lifeguard station duties. She made no rescues during this period and sighted only one enemy ship. That occurred on the night of 14 May, and all four torpedoes that she fired missed the target. On 29 May, Spikefish was ordered to take station off Sakishima Gunto and act as lifeguard for carrier planes in the area. On 5 June, she bombarded Miyara airstrip on Ishigaki Jima with her 5-inch (130 mm) gun. Two days later, the submarine rescued a downed pilot whose plane had crashed after taking off from escort carrier, Sargent Bay (CVE-83). She returned to Guam on 13 June.

Spikefish began her last war patrol on 8 July with an uneventful patrol in the Yellow Sea and lifeguard duty off Shanghai. On 24 July, she bombarded Surveyor Island, off the China coast, in an attempt to destroy an enemy radar station. Shortly after midnight on 11 August, she located a small Japanese cargo ship near her lifeguard station but could not make positive identification at night. The ship was dead in the water, so Spikefish waited until morning, identified it as enemy and sank it with gunfire. Three survivors were brought on board. On the night of 13 August about 190 nmi (350 km) southeast of Shanghai, she made radar contact with a surfaced submarine. After tracking it for about an hour, the submarine submerged and disappeared from Spikefish's scope. At 00:07, contact was regained and the submarine was tracked until morning, when she was sighted on the surface. Her silhouette proved her to be Japanese. Spikefish fired six torpedoes. Two hit the target, which sank in a cloud of smoke at 29°02′N 123°53′E. The sole survivor who was taken prisoner identified the submarine as *I-373*; she was the last Japanese submarine sunk in the war.

Post War service and fate

After the war she returned to New London, her home port, she was assigned to Submarine Squadron 2 and trained personnel of the submarine school. Her training duty was interrupted by an overhaul from 7 April to 22 September 1947; a cruise to Bermuda from 25 September to 2 October 1947; and another overhaul at Philadelphia Naval Shipyard from 16 May to 8 July 1948. *Spikefish* operated from New London making training cruises along the east coast from Bermuda to Nova Scotia until 30 April 1955. On that day, she and *Piper* (SS-409) sailed for the Mediterranean and deployment with the 6th Fleet. *Spikefish* returned to New London on 8 October 1955 and resumed her normal training duties until early 1963. On 18 March 1960, *Spikefish* became the first United States submarine to record 10,000 dives.

Spikefish was redesignated an Auxiliary Research Submarine and renumbered AGSS-404 (auxiliary, submarine) in 1962. She was decommissioned at Key West, Florida on 2 April 1963 and was stricken from the Navy list on 1 May 1963. She was subsequently sunk as a target in August 1964 off Long Island, New York.

Spikefish received three battle stars for World War II service.



Memorial to 84 WWII U.S. Sailors Lost Aboard USS Bullhead Unveiled in Australia

As dates go, Aug. 6 is especially important to commemorate of the end of World War II. On that day in 1945, the American bomber Enola Gay dropped an atomic bomb on Hiroshima, Japan, thus setting in motion the steps that would lead to the surrender of Japan.

Less well known is the fact that the U.S. Navy suffered an important loss on that same date. Just after 8 a.m. Aug. 6, at roughly the same time that Enola Gay was beginning her bomb run, a Japanese plane on patrol off the island of Bali caught an American submarine on the surface of the Java Sea. The pilot attacked, his bombs found their mark, and the sub sank with all hands. Eighty-four brave submarine sailors perished when Bullhead sank.

The USS Bullhead (SS 332) turned out to be the last of 701 U.S. Navy ships lost in World War II. The loss of an entire submarine crew at the end of a long and awful war was a sad story in its own right, yet the submarine has never rated more than a footnote in the history books. As storylines go, it's hard to compete with the atomic bomb.



A memorial to the 84 officers and crew of the last U.S. Navy ship lost in World War II, USS *Bullhead* (SS-332), was recently unveiled in Fremantle, Western Australia, a vital homeport to American, British and Dutch submarines in the Pacific theater.

The memorial, located outside the Western Australian Maritime Museum, was dedicated Aug. 6., the 76th anniversary of the submarine's sinking by Japanese aircraft in the Java Sea, off the coast of Bali near the mouth of the Lombok Strait.

American consul-general David Gainer said at the dedication ceremony that the memorial underscored the United States' unwavering commitment to Australia. "Lives aboard USS *Bullhead* were lost defending Australia. This memorial is a powerful symbol of their courage and the unbreakable alliance between our two countries."

Aboard a nuclear-powered submarine, 'everything changes on a dime'

"The role of the fast attack submarine is so dynamic that everything changes on a dime," U.S. Navy Commander Jeffrey Corneille said off the coast of Western Australia on the nuclear-

powered submarine USS Minnesota in March.

"As soon as my boss says go, we go," said Corneille, the ship's commander.

A 2018 letter from the U.S. Secretary of Defense hangs on a wall in the Minnesota, expressing gratitude for its anti-submarine warfare and intelligence gathering in Europe.

Giving pause for thought to an adversary is "not just important

for the United States, it's important for all of our partners to work together to get to that", Corneille said.

The submarine recently moved its home port from Hawaii to Guam, the first forward deployment of a Virginia-class submarine.

"In time of conflict, that is where we replenish, repair and rearm," said Captain Neil Steinhagen, Commander of Guam's Submarine Squadron 15, which includes four Los Angeles-class nuclear-powered attack subs alongside the Minnesota.

A port call at HMAS Stirling is preparation for hundreds of U.S. Navy personnel arriving in 2027, and Australians joining the crew of U.S.-commanded Virginia submarines.

The Virginia's "34-year gas tank" gives it the speed to run down its adversary, said Steinhagen, describing the difference between nuclear propulsion and Australia's ageing diesel-electric submarine fleet, which lurk and listen in Indo Pacific chokepoints.
