Lost Boats

December


USS Capelin (SS-289)

Lost on Dec 2, 1943 with the loss of 76 men. She was on her 1st war patrol, but her exact location, date and cause of loss remain a mystery. She may have been lost to mines or an operational casualty.



USS Sealion (SS-195)

Lost on Dec 10, 1941 with the loss of 4 men. To prevent her from falling into enemy hands, she was scuttled in Manila Bay after incurring severe bomb damage during the initial Japanese attack. One other Sealion man was later captured and died in POW camp.



USS F-1 / Carp (SS-20)

Lost on December 17, 1917 with the loss of 19 officers and men when it was sunk after collision with the USS F-3 (Pickerel(SS-22)) off San Clemente, CA.



USS S-4 (SS-109)

Lost on December 17, 1927 with the loss of 40 officers and men when it was sunk after being rammed by USCG Paulding. Salvaged in 1928 and recommissioned.





Ed McCarthy joined the Navy in 1981 and qualified on the USS Bergall (SSN-667) in 1983. He was discharged as a Machinist Mate First Class in 1987. He joined USSVI and Gold Country in December of 2021 and became a Life Member in March 2022. Almost immediately after joining our base Ed stepped up to be of service. That began with using his expertise

in the field of IT to help Nick with managing our website. He has now taken over full responsibility for continually maintaining and updating that site and his efforts in doing so have created an effective tool to aid us with member communication and in our new member recruitment efforts.

Another area but Ed stepped up to assist and has now taken over full responsibility for is Events Coordinator. December 7th Guest Speaker

This years Guest Speaker for our December 7th Memorial event was Sacramento County Supervisor Rosario Rodriguez . Her talk was clearly impactful and certainly one of the best we have ever had for this event.

Rosario Rodriguez

Thank you, and good morning everyone.

Today, on December 7th, we gather with a profound sense of gratitude and reflection. It was on this date in 1941 that our nation was forever changed by the attack on Pearl Harbor. That day, ordinary Americans, sailors, soldiers, nurses, and civilians woke up to what they thought would be a normal Sunday and instead became part of history.

We remember them today not just as names in a book or faces in a black-and-white photo, but as real people who stood in the gap for our country. They were young. Many were scared. And yet they stepped forward. That spirit of service and sacrifice is exactly why it is so important that we honor our veterans, not only on days of remembrance, but every single day.

Honoring our veterans is not a tradition of convenience; it is a moral obligation.

We honor our veterans because they made a promise...to defend this country, even at the cost of their own lives. They missed holidays, birthdays, graduations. They carried burdens most of us will never fully understand. Some came home with visible injuries; others carry wounds that cannot be seen.

When we say, "Thank you for your service," or "Thank you for our freedom", it should never be a throwaway lines. It is an acknowledgment that the comfort we enjoy, the freedoms we exercise, and the debates we have in our communities all rest on a foundation that veterans helped secure.

To honor veterans means more than ceremonies and speeches, though those matter. It means making real commitments:

- Ensuring they have access to quality healthcare and mental health services.
- Supporting their transition to civilian careers.

Standing by their families, who also served in their own way...waiting, worrying, and holding things together back home.

We cannot change what our veterans faced in the past, but we can absolutely shape how we stand with them in the present.

What's remarkable is that when veterans come home, they don't just fade into the background. They lead in our communities, veterans are:

- Small business owners who create jobs.
- Teachers and coaches who mentor the next generation.
- Law enforcement officers and first responders who continue to protect and serve.

Volunteers, nonprofit leaders, and public servants who show up where there is need.

They bring with them the values they honed in uniform: discipline, courage, teamwork, and a deep understanding that success is never about one person...it's about the whole unit, the whole community.

When a veteran steps into leadership, they bring a mentality of service over self. They know what it means to say, "I've got your back," and mean it.

They are used to working with people from every background, every belief, every corner of this country.

That is exactly the kind of leadership our communities need...especially in times when it can feel like we are more divided than united.

So when we talk about honoring veterans, we should also be asking:

How can we better support veterans stepping into public life?

How can we listen to their experience and their ideas?

How can we make sure they have a seat at the table when decisions are being made?

Because veterans are not just part of our history...they are vital to our future.

For me, this is not only a public commitment; it is a deeply personal one.

My late husband proudly served in the United States Coast Guard. His service was a source of great pride in his family. The Coast Guard may not always be the first branch people think of when joining the military, but their role is absolutely essential...guarding our shores, saving lives at sea, protecting our ports, and standing ready in times of war and peace.

Through his stories, I learned about the long nights, the tough calls, and the enormous responsibility of knowing that other people's safety depends on your training and your judgment. His time in the Coast Guard shaped his character:

- His was calm under pressure.
- His sense of duty.

His instinct to jump in and help whenever someone was in need.

Those qualities didn't end when his service ended. They showed up in our home, in our community, and in the way he treated people...always with respect, always with a quiet strength.

Losing him was heartbreaking, but his legacy of service lives on. It lives on in the stories we tell, in the values he passed down, and in the deep respect I feel for every man and woman who has worn a uniform.

When I stand up and speak about veterans, I am not talking about an abstract group. I am talking about people like my husband. I am talking about people like your spouses, your parents, your children, your friends.

On this day, December 7th, we are reminded of the words President Roosevelt used: "a date which will live in infamy." But that phrase is only meaningful if we choose to remember...if we choose to keep history alive.

History is not just about the past. It is a guide for the present and a warning for the future.

When we remember Pearl Harbor, we remember:

- The cost of being unprepared.
- The resilience of a nation that refused to be broken.

The extraordinary courage of those who rushed toward danger instead of away from it.

We remember the ships that burned, the heroes who fought back, and the families who received the worst kind of news. We remember the thousands of lives lost in a single morning...and the millions who would go on to serve in World War II because their country needed them.

Preserving that history is not optional. It is essential.

Every monument, every museum, every story passed down at a kitchen table keeps that history alive. When we bring our children and grandchildren to memorials, when we teach them about Pearl Harbor and all the conflicts before and after, we are not glorifying war. We are honoring sacrifice. We are teaching them the value of peace—and the price that has been paid to defend it.

On days like today, we are called to do three things:

1. Remember those who served and those who never came home.
2. Reflect on the freedoms we enjoy and how fragile they truly are.
3. Resolve to live in a way that is worthy of their sacrifice.

The attack on Pearl Harbor pushed an entire generation to step up. Many of them were not much older than the young people we see in our schools and neighborhoods today. They answered the call, often not knowing what they were heading into.

Today, we face different challenges, but we still need that same spirit:

- A willingness to serve something bigger than ourselves.
- A readiness to stand up for what is right, even when it is difficult.

A commitment to unity, even when it is easier to be divided.

Our veterans have modeled that for us.

The question for us is: What do we do with the gift they've given us?

Do we become passive consumers of the freedom they secured, or do we become active stewards of it—engaged in our communities, informed about our history, and committed to building a better future?

When we support a veteran-owned business, when we hire a veteran, when we show up at a ceremony like this, when we teach our kids to stand respectfully during the national anthem—not because anyone forces them to, but because they understand why—it all matters. These are the small acts that add up to a culture of genuine respect.

A Call to Action

So on this December 7th, as we reflect on Pearl Harbor and honor all who served before and after that day, I want to leave you with a few simple invitations:

- First, if you are a veteran here today: thank you. Truly. Your service matters more than we can ever fully express.
- Second, if you know a veteran—reach out. Not just today, but regularly. Ask them about their stories. Listen. You may be surprised by what you learn and how much it means to them to be heard.

Third, support veterans in concrete ways: advocate for strong services, support local organizations that serve them, and create opportunities for them to lead in our communities.

And finally, let us commit to being a community that remembers:

That remembers Pearl Harbor.

That remembers every conflict since.

That remembers the families, the sacrifices, the empty chairs at the table.

Because when we remember, we honor.

When we honor, we learn.

And when we learn, we become a people worthy of the price that has been paid on our behalf.

To all our veterans, to the families who have stood beside them, and to the memory of those like my late husband who carried the spirit of service throughout their lives: we see you, we thank you, and we will not forget.

May we live, lead, and serve in a way that honors you...not just in our words today, but in our actions every day.

Thank you, and God bless our veterans, God bless their families, and God bless the United States of America.


In September we opened nominations for the Base Secretary and Vice Commander and held the election in October for those critical positions. Mark And Diana were both reelected.






Featured Boat

USS Rasher (SS/SSR/AGSS/IXSS-269), a Gato-class submarine



USS *Rasher* made eight war patrols during World War II. During the first five patrols *Rasher* sank more tonnage of enemy shipping than any other submarine in history, except *USS Flasher*. *Rasher* was credited with sinking eighteen ships for a total of 99,901 tons of shipping. She also damaged 62,481 tons of shipping.

Rasher earned seven Battle Stars, four Navy Crosses, twelve Silver Stars, sixteen Bronze Stars, one Legion of Merit, one Navy & Marine Corps Medal, six Commendations, and a Presidential Unit Citation. The value of enemy cargoes and combat loaded troraphips which *Rasher* prevented from reaching a destination is impossible to estimate. In terms of Japanese soldiers who never arrived to fight, ammunition which didn't arrive to be fired at U.S. troops and enemy planes which never got in the air, *USS Rasher*'s contribution to the war effort was tremendous. In 1951 *Rasher* was first converted to a radar picket submarine (SSR) and then to an auxiliary submarine (AGSS) in 1961, serving with Pacific Fleet out of San Diego, CA earning two more Battle Stars before being stricken from the Naval Register in 1971.

Submarine Facts Of Interest

2025

The U.S. Submarine Force comprises approximately 7 percent of the Navy's total personnel and more than 25 percent of its ships, yet roughly only 10 percent of the Navy's budget. Our submarines bring incredible value to our country.

There are a total of 71 submarines. The largest numbers, 51, are SSNs, otherwise known as fast attack submarines. They are located in Groton, Conn., Norfolk, Va., San Diego, Hawaii and Guam. There are 14 SSBNs (Submarine Ballistic Missile, Nuclear), and they are located at Kings Bay and Bangor, Wash. There are four SSGNs (Submarine Guided Missile, Nuclear), two at Kings Bay and two at Bangor.

When SSBN/GNs are away from Kings Bay on patrol, they are providing capabilities for Strategic Deterrence, Anti-Submarine and Anti-Surface Warfare, Special Operations Forces, Intelligence, Surveillance and Reconnaissance war fighting readiness, Counter Drug Operations, Mine Warfare and Strike. The deployed submarines can patrol an area as big as a state, and no one knows where they are.

The inherent stealth and endurance makes them a valuable tool for any fleet commander. They provide a clandestine and non-proactive presence that can give real-time warning to U.S. leadership.

WWII

During World War II, the U.S. Submarine Force was a very small part of the overall U.S. Navy, making up **less than 2%** of its forces, yet it achieved disproportionate results by sinking 200 - 250 Imperial Japanese Navy (IJN) warships, including 8 aircraft carriers & 11 cruisers and crippling over 60% of its merchant marine, causing the most casualties of any U.S. service branch.

Key Facts:

- **Small Percentage:** Submarines comprised less than 2% of the U.S. Navy's total forces but were responsible for over half the tonnage sunk in the Pacific.
- **Massive Impact:** By sinking a huge portion of Japan's navy and severely hampered their ability to supply troops.
- **Critical Role:** By cutting off Japan's resources, they crippled its war effort and starved its people, making them the most effective weapon in the Pacific.
- **High Casualties:** The Submarine Service suffered the highest casualty rate of any U.S. force in the war, losing 52 submarines and over 3,500 men (about 20%).



WWII Submarines

Eugene B. Fluckey Rear Admiral O-8, U.S. Navy

80 years ago, from 19 December 1944 to 15 February 1945, 31-year-old Commander Eugene B. Fluckey was leading the American submarine USS Barb on a perilous war patrol off the coast of China.

On January 8, 1945, he had already sunk a large enemy ammunition ship and damaged multiple other vessels during a fierce two-hour night battle with a Japanese convoy.

In late January, Fluckey's submarine discovered an even bigger target, a concentration of over thirty Japanese ships anchored in Namkwan Harbor along the Chinese coast.

He realized that to strike and escape, USS Barb would have to race at full speed for about an hour through uncharted shallows, thick with enemy mines, rocks, and other hazards.

Fully aware of the extreme danger, Commander Fluckey nevertheless gave the order: "Battle stations, torpedoes!"

Under cover of darkness, the Barb slipped past the harbor's patrol craft and heavy defenses and crept in to point-blank range, navigating in water barely five fathoms (30 feet) deep.

Closing to just 3,000 yards from the unsuspecting enemy fleet, Fluckey unleashed a salvo of the sub's last forward torpedoes.

He then quickly swung the submarine around and fired four more torpedoes from the stern tubes into the clustered ships.

A series of tremendous explosions followed as the torpedoes found their marks, eight direct hits blasting apart at least six enemy ships, including a large ammunition vessel that erupted in a massive fireball, hurling shells and debris high into the night sky.

Pushing his engines to the limit, Fluckey ordered the submarine to run at flank speed (over 23 knots) and led a daring escape on the surface.

For more than an hour, the Barb weaved through the mined, rock-obstructed harbor channels at top speed, dodging enemy escorts and shallow reefs until she finally broke free into open water and safety.

Amazingly, not a single crewman was lost or injured during this operation, and later, on January 29, 1945, Fluckey sank another large Japanese freighter to cap off the submarine's record-setting patrol.

For this extraordinary feat of "conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity" above and beyond the call of duty, Commander Eugene B. Fluckey was awarded the Medal of Honor.



He personally received the medal from Secretary of the Navy James Forrestal in a ceremony in Washington, D.C., on March 23, 1945.

Fluckey survived the war and continued his Navy service, eventually retiring as a rear admiral.

He died on June 28, 2007, in Annapolis, Maryland, at the age of 93 from complications of Alzheimer's disease.



The **USS Barb (SS-220)** was a U.S. submarine famous for sinking a Japanese train by planting explosives on the tracks in July 1945, marking the first time a submarine destroyed a train and the first

American "invasion" of Japan's home islands during WWII. A small crew landed ashore, rigged a scuttling charge with a pressure trigger, and the subsequent explosion derailed and destroyed a 16-car supply train, sending wreckage 200 feet into the air.

Keel laid for Virginia-class attack submarine USS Barb

A legendary name...an awesome capability...the journey begins on the future USS Barb (SSN 804)!

December 10, 2025, HII's Newport News Shipbuilding (NNS) division hosted the keel laying ceremony today for *Virginia*-class attack submarine *Barb* (SSN 804).

SSN 804 will be the third U.S. Navy submarine to carry the name *Barb*. The first, SS 220, was commissioned in 1942. During World War II, the submarine conducted missions under the command of Eugene "Lucky" Fluckey, earning the submarine four Presidential Citations, a Navy Unit Commendation and eight battle stars for outstanding service. The second, SSN 596, was a nuclear-powered submarine commissioned in 1963. It was sponsored by Marjorie Fluckey, the wife of Rear Adm. Fluckey. The submarine took part in special operations during the Vietnam War.

Pamela Bove serves as ship's sponsor for the newest *Barb*. Bove began her analytical career working as a civilian within the submarine division at the Navy Operational Intelligence Center. She later accepted a position with a defense company where she met her husband Thomas "Tom" Bove, grandson of Rear Adm. Fluckey.

During Tuesday's ceremony, NNS welder Andrew Kahler etched Bove's initials onto a metal plate, signifying the keel of SSN 804 as being "truly and fairly laid." The metal plate will remain affixed to the submarine throughout its life.

Barb is the 31st *Virginia*-class fast attack submarine and will be the 15th delivered by NNS.

The advanced capabilities of *Virginia*-class submarines increase firepower, maneuverability and stealth.
