Acts 10 verses 1 & 2: There was a certain man in Caesarea called Cornelius, a cen-

turion of what was called the Italian Regiment, ² a

devout man and one who feared God with all his household, who gave alms generously to the people, and prayed to God always. This takes place about 44AD. A centurion was a leader of 100 soldiers and in todays term would be



somewhere between a Master Sargent and a Major. He was paid about 11 times more than the newest recruits. His authority was so great he could almost do anything he wanted. In short being a centurion was a license to steal. But in the half dozen times centurions are mentioned in the new testament they are portrayed in a positive sense. Caesarea was the Roman capital of Israel named after Caesar Augustus. This story involves a 4-day time period and 2 significant visions that make a big change to the early church. *More next time.*

Lost Boats

USS Lagarto (SS-371)

Lost on May 3, 1945 with the loss of 86 men near the Gulf of Siam. On her 2nd war patrol, she is believed to have been lost to a radar equipped minelayer. This minelayer was sunk by the USS Hawkbill (SS-366) 2 weeks later.





USS Scorpion (SSN-589)

USS Scorpion (SSN-589) was returning to Norfolk, VA. from a Mediterranean deployment. On May 22,1968 she reported her position to be about 50 miles south of the Azores. Scorpion was never heard from again. The exact cause of her loss has never been determined. 99 officers and men were lost.





USS Squalus (SS-192)

On May 23, 1939 USS Squalus suffered a catastrophic valve failure during a test dive off the Isle of Shoals. Partially flooded, the submarine sank to the bottom and came to rest keel down in 240 feet of water. Commander Charles Momsen and Navy divers on the USS Falcon (ASR-2) rescued 33 survivors use the diving bell he invented. 26 men drowned in the after





compartments. Later Squalus was raised and recommissioned as the USS Sailfish. In an ironic turn of fate, Sailfish sank the Japanese aircraft carrier carrying surviving crew members from Sculpin, which had located Squalus in 1939. Only one of survived after spending the rest of the war as slave laborers in Japan.

USS Stickleback (SS-415)

Lost on May 28, 1958 when it sank off Hawaii while under tow after collision with USS Silverstein (DE-534). The entire crew was taken off prior to sinking.









VA Information

VA Partners to Increase Medical Providers:

In May, the Department of Veterans Affairs entered into a partnership with the Department of Health and Human Services. This partnership will allow medical professionals from the U.S. Public Health Service Commissioned Corps to provide care to veterans at VA medical facilities. Effective immediately, the partnership agreement allows up to 20 medical professionals from the Commissioned Corps to provide treatment in VA facilities deemed to be in the most need of staffing support. An additional 10 officers from the Commissioned Corps are able to assist in support coordination for veterans receiving VA community care.

The Last Ride on the Kamehameha A Sea Story by Howard Grover

The date was the middle of January 1969. I was due to get out of the Navy in a couple weeks. I had just finished my last patrol on the Kamehameha. We turned the boat over to the Blue Crew and were filing off the Kam. On the Proteus, I took a last look at the Kam below. I was thinking that was the last 41/2 years of my life. Then somehow, I just knew I would see the Kam again. A couple months later another strange thing happened. I dreamed my Kam Captain called me and told me; "Grover, I need you to make one more patrol". The dream ended with me reporting aboard. That same dream repeated itself about every 2 to 3 months for 32 years.

The last date I mentioned was 1969. Now jump forward 30 years to April 1999. For family reasons, I was on Oahu. My wife and I were at the Bowfin Museum. We spent several hours there and got to meet the retired Captain, Manager. I mentioned to the Captain I had been a part of the crew that brought the Kam to Hawaii. He told me she was in port and if I wanted to see her I better do it quickly. The next day I called Base information. I told the receptionist I want to come on Base. After some run around I said I was a member of WWII Sub Vets (Associate Member). She then said: "Mr. Grover when do you want to come out."

As instructed we went to the vender building out outside the main gate. As soon as I waked into the building I recognized that it had been the Bank of Hawaii where I had my first checking account. At the counter, I told the lady there why I was there. She looked in a notebook and did not find my name. She slides a phone over to me and fortunately I remembered the phone number of the lady at COMSUBPAC I had talked to the day before. She answered and then told me to come out to the parking lot and she would be there shortly. She was a civilian driving her own car. She said follow me and went to the gate and said something to the Marine guard. She drove ahead. The Marine handed us a pass and waved us on. We followed her car to Sub Base.

As we drove through the Base I pointed out land marks to Lila. Pretty soon we turned on to Sub Base. We turned and drove down between what looked like warehouses. We came to a stop sign. We were at pier C and tied up there was the Kamehameha. It had been just over 30 years since I saw her last in Guam. Tears welled up in my eyes as I realized what had just happened. There was two way traffic on the pier so we had to drive to the end of the pier then turn around. The ComSubPac lady parked right across from the Kam. We pulled next to her. I got her email address and thank her. She drove off. I walked over to the loading party at the Kam and talked to the Chief in charge.

I told the Senior Chief in charge of the loading party that I was one of the original crew and I would like a tour. He said, we'll see what we can do for you but we need to finish loading stores. I got in line and started handing boxes down the line. The Chief called over to the topside watch and asked him to call down to get permission for a plankowner tour." In a few minutes word came up, "Permission granted after the stores are off the deck. The next word was there would be an E6 Nav ET for the tour. Just wait. The crew topside and below decks asked several times, "Do you know Capt. Dickieson?" He was my Gold crew CO. He was retired and lived on the other side of the island. He would occasionally eat lunch on board.

I went down into the control first followed by Lila and our tour guide. The control room hadn't changed much but the Nav area had changed. The rear end of the Nav area had been converted to Special Ops control. The refrigerator sized SINS were small boxes in the overhead. Down the ladder to the middle level the COB greeted us. After visiting the chow hall and torpedo room I showed Lila my first of many racks in the lower level. In the crews area we began meeting the electricians 2 or 3 at a time. They all had questions for me as a one-time LPO. In the missile compartment racks for the SEAIs replaced missile equipment. We met the present LPO and more electricians. One of them told me they would be decommissioned a couple years. Why don't you come to that? We went out the AMR1 hatch.

Both of the dry-dock shelters were open and we got to look in both. They were full of equipment for the SEALS. That was the tour but the Senior Chief we first met came off the boat and we talked for a good 15 minutes or more. I had been overwhelmed by the attention I had received on board. Lila has mentioned many times since; that the crew just wanted to see what kind of wheel chair I was using. Since I was old enough to have been a grandfather to most of them. We were now free and with our visitor pass we drove all over Sub Base. First, we went to Beeman's Center for lunch. Then looking at all the boats that were in. Next to the WWII Memorial and then I climbed all over the old Parche sail despite the sign that said NO! What a day! **TO BE CONTINUED**
