



Lost Boats

January

USS Scorpion (SS-278)

Lost on Jan 5,1944 with the loss of 76 officers and men in the East China Sea, on her 4th war patrol. It is assumed she was sunk by a mine.





USS Argonaut (SS-166)

Lost on Jan 10, 1943 with the loss of 102 officers and men off Rabaul, on her 3rd war patrol. While attacking a convoy, she torpedoed a Jap destroyer who along with 2 other destroyers depth charged her. As she tried to surface, the destroyers sunk her by gun fire.






USS Swordfish (SS-193)

Lost on Jan 12,1945 with the loss of 89 officers and men somewhere near Okinawa, on her 13th war patrol. Probably was lost to a mine.





USS S-36 (SS-141)

Lost on Jan 20, 1942 with no loss of life, on her 2nd war patrol. She ran hard aground on a reef and radioed for help. The entire crew was rescued by a Dutch ship after they scuttled her.





USS S-26 (SS-131)

Lost on Jan 24,1942 with the loss of 46 officers and men in the Gulf of Panama, on her 2nd war patrol. She was rammed by the USS PC-460 and sunk within seconds. The CO, XO and one lookout on the bridge, were the only survivors.







Submarine Tender USS Pelias AS-14 at Pearl Harbor December 7th 1941

WO Carl Fredrick Lee

My father, then a WO Machinist, was duty officer of the day on Pelias December 7th.

After the attack on Pearl Harbor the Navy ordered Pelias to Mare Island Naval Ship Yard for repairs and preparations for transfer of duty station to Fremantle, Australia. Pelias arrived Mare Island early May 1942. Pelias departed Mare Island June 22, 1942 for Fremantle, Australia.

My mother and I lived on Mare Island, Quarters 131 Walnut Avenue. We lived most of WW11 there with my grandparents. My grandfather, William Willey was a long term "Yard Bird". He started there in 1901 and retired after the war in 1948. He was civilian in charge of all of the dry docks since 1931. Upon his retirement he received of letter of commendation from then Secretary of the Navy, James Forrestal for his 47 years of service to our nation.

From July 1942 until May 1944, Pelias repaired and refitted 59 submarines of Squadrons 12 & 14! During

this period of duty in Australia, my father, an expert in submarine periscope optics developed a flashing light ability for periscopes. Ultimately this ability of a submerged submarine to signal flashing light messages to the shore was responsible for the saving a large number US Marines lives stranded on a small island in the South Pacific. Then, LT. Lee received a signed letter of appreciation from Presi-



dent Roosevelt. (Unfortunately after my father's passing I was unable to acquire that document.) Pelias was ordered back to Mare Island June 1944 and my Mother and Father were reunited at last after a long separation during WW11. Their marriage did not survive very long after that. My Father, Carl F. Lee remained in the Navy and ultimately retired as a Mustang Commander.

Liberty must have been pretty good for the crew of Pelias in Mare Island/ Vallejo. Nine months after Pelias arrived at Mare Island May 1942, I was born!


USS Sculpin SS-191 – a Sargo-class submarine – departed Hawaii on 5 November 1943 for her ninth war patrol to hunt the area north of Truk. The Sculpin was to intercept and attack Japanese forces expected to leave Truk to oppose the forthcoming invasion of Tarawa in the Gilbert Islands. Sculpin and two other submarines were to form a wolfpack to make coordinated attacks on the enemy. In addition to her officers and men, also onboard Sculpin was Captain John Cromwell, who had been fully briefed on the Tarawa operation and was knowledgeable about ULTRA, assigned to Sculpin to coordinate wolf pack operations.

On the morning of 19 November 1943 Sculpin, pursuing a fast Japanese convoy north of Oroluk Island near Truk, made a fast end run on the surface to attack. She achieved a firing position but was forced to dive when the convoy and its escorts zigged toward her. When the Japanese task force again changed course, Sculpin surfaced to make yet another end run, but was discovered by the IJN Yamagumo positioned only 600 yards away. The IJN destroyer had been left behind for just this eventuality by the Japanese convoy commander. Diving fast, Sculpin escaped the first salvo of what was to be four vicious salvoes of depth charges, with flooding and damaging equipment and losing sonar. Sculpin evaded the destroyer in a rain squall and around

1200 attempted to come to periscope depth. The damaged depth gauge stuck at 125 feet, so the submarine inadvertently broached – and was again detected by Yamagumo.

The submarine's commanding officer, Commander Fred Connaway, decided to surface to give the crew of the doomed vessel a chance for survival. With her decks still awash, Sculpin's gunners manned the deck guns but were no match for the destroyer's main battery. A shell hit the conning tower and killed the bridge watch, including Connaway, and flying fragments killed the gun crew, including gunnery officer Lieutenant Joseph Defrees, who was the ship's sponsor's son.

The ship's senior surviving officer, Lieutenant George Brown, ordered Sculpin abandoned and scuttled. Before he opened the vents, he informed Captain Cromwell. Fearing that he might reveal the plans for the Tarawa invasion under the influence of torture or drugs, Cromwell refused to leave the stricken submarine, giving his



life to avoid capture. He was posthumously awarded the Medal of Honor for his act of heroism and devotion to country. Sculpin's diving officer, Ensign W. M. Fiedler (who had failed to notice the depth gauge had stuck), along with forty others, including the already dead, joined him.

Forty-two of Sculpin's crew were picked up by the Yamagumo. However, one badly-wounded sailor, SN William Henry Walsh, was thrown back into the sea to die by the Japanese because of his condition. The other 41 survivors were questioned for about ten days at the Japanese naval base at Truk, and then were embarked on two aircraft carriers returning to Japan. The carrier Chuyo carried 21 of the 41 survivors in her hold.

On 4 December 1943, the Chuyo was torpedoed and sunk by the USS Sailfish. It took Sailfish more than nine hours and 11 torpedoes to sink the carrier, and 20 of the 21 American prisoners perished. One man, George Rocek, was saved when he was able escape the carrier and grab hold of a ladder on the side of a passing Japanese destroyer, hauling himself aboard. (Continued on next page)

Anyone would think that when the first torpedo hit the carrier, then the second, there would be a dire sense of dread among the POWs on Chuyo who had just cheated death on their own sub, and were now staring at it again. But according to Rocek, instead, they <u>cheered</u> – they began jumping up and down, and yelling, "Sink the SOB!" – even though they were on it. They were cheering the sealing of their own fate, but it didn't matter to them – only sinking that 20,000-ton carrier mattered.


On 5 December Rocek and the other 20 Sculpin survivors arrived at Ōfuna Camp, Japan, and, after further questioning, were sent to work in the Ashio copper mines for the duration of the war. All 21 survived the war.

Ironically, the Sailfish – at the time named Squalus – was the same submarine that Sculpin had helped to locate, rescue and raise some four-and-a-half years earlier.

63 lost of 81 aboard: 39 (d/c & gunfire; scuttling) + 3 (gun crew) + 1 (SN Walsh) + 20 (Chuyo sinking)

USS Sculpin (SS-191), a Sargo-class submarine, was launched on 27 July 1938, sponsored by Mrs. Bernice F. Defrees, wife of Rear Admiral Joseph R. Defrees, Sr, Chief of Staff to the Commander, Scouting Force, US Fleet, and commissioned on 16 January 1939.

- 0640 Yamagumo sights enemy submarine (USS Sculpin) surfacing on the port beam, and seeing it quickly submerge begins a series of alternate depth-charge and pinging runs.
- 1109 The damaged submarine accidentally broaches the surface, and the destroyer reacquires and intensifies the attack.
- 1256 The Sculpin surfaces, being crippled and unable to stay submerged. The submarine opts for a desperate gunfire duel with its starboard side facing Yamagumo's starboard side as they exchange fire at 2,000 yards.
- 1307 The submarine is listing and the destroyer ceases fire and ten minutes later dispatches rescue boats as the scuttled submarine submerges for the last time in what looked to her survivors almost like a normal dive.



After the Sculpin sinking 21 survivors were taken as POWs to the mountains north of Tokyo near Ashio. There they were forced to labor in the Ashio Copper Mines, a polluted area since the 1880's. After 22 months of terrible hardship the survivors of the Sculpin and their fellow POWs were liberated by U.S. Forces on 5 September 1945.

Navy Submarine News

Navy to add new attack submarines by 2045 in massive surge

The prospect of a rapid uptick in attack submarine production has been discussed for several years

New Virginia-class attack submarines are being built with a massive increase in firepower, much more sensitive and with powerful sonar detection and a new generation of computing, navigation, and command and control systems ... and the Navy does not have enough of them.

It is a challenge that the Navy's recently released **30-year shipbuilding plan** seeks to correct, by calling for an increase in submarine production and acquisition in coming years to address emerging threats, meet grow-

ing requests from Combatant Commanders and greatly expand the mission scope for attack submarines to include more reconnaissance and clandestine undersea patrols.

The prospect of a rapid uptick in attack submarine production has been discussed and advocated now for several years by both members of Congress and senior U.S. Navy leaders who have for quite some time voiced concerns about the size and reach of the service's submarine fleet in coming years. As more Los Angeles class submarines, which have functioned well for dec-



ades, retire, there will be a **fast-evolving** and pressing need for larger numbers of submarines to replace them and also advance the technical curve by engineering a new generation of attack submarine capability.

NAVY ELECTRONIC WARFARE STOPS MULTIPLE ENEMY MISSILE ATTACKS AT ONCE

"Analysis is ongoing to reach the goal of more consistently procuring three SSNs [nuclear submarines] per year," the plan says. In total, the Shipbuilding plan states that the Navy hopes to operate as many as 72 attack submarines, up from 54, by 2045.

The plan cites what it calls an "adjustment" in funding for a large 12-ship multiyear buy of the emerging Block VI Virginia-class attack boats. This is extremely significant in a number of key respects as the emerging Block VI boats, underway with conceptual **development and prototyping**, will incorporate new attack submarine technologies designed to improve performance and expand mission scope.

Congress and the Navy seem quite committed to the adjustment to build three per year starting in 2025 and 2026, as evidenced by the Shipbuilding plan's addition of \$1.7B to support "shipyard facilitation." The move likely reflects **ongoing assessments** and industrial base studies which have for several years now found that the U.S. industrial capacity does indeed possess the ability to successfully "flex" to accommodate a larger buy.

The Navy's Shipbuilding plan emphasizes that industrial base assessments regarding how to sustain an increased production rate of Virginia-class submarines continue.

NAVY 'MOVES-OUT' ON OPERATING 11 AIRCRAFT CARRIERS



"We are in the process of assessing the industrial base capability to continue delivering three SSNs per year past FY26 during Columbia serial production. The post-FYDP [Future Years Defense Program] SSN profile will continue to be reviewed and updated in subsequent plans as the industrial base assessments are refined with the goal of three SSNs per year, if affordable and supportable by the industrial base," the Navy Shipbuilding plan writes.

Part of the growing need for attack submarines is inspired by technological breakthroughs in recent years wherein new "quieting" systems are now more able to improve stealthy undersea maneuvering potential. Some of these applications, which began several years ago with the Navy's USS South Dakota Block III Virginia-class attack submarine, including new antennas, coating materials and engine propulsion quieting tech-

nologies, Navy developers have explained over the years.
These kinds of breakthroughs impact the tactical equation by improving the attack submarines' ability to command and control small fleets of undersea drones and conduct clandestine undersea reconnaissance patrols in high-risk, littoral coastal areas less accessible to large, deep draft surface ships. There are significant tactical implications regarding firepower as



well, given that as many as nine or more of the upcoming Virginias will be built with what's called Virginia Payload Modules, an extra 80-foot section added to the boats to massively increase firepower capability from 12 Tomahawks up to 40. This, of course, gives the boats an ability to conduct major land attacks potentially in closer proximity than larger surface ships






