

Lost Boats

January

USS Scorpion (SS-278)

Lost on Jan 5,1944 with the loss of 76 officers and men in the East China Sea, on her 4th war patrol.

It is assumed she was sunk by a mine.





USS Argonaut (SS-166)

Lost on Jan 10, 1943 with the loss of 102 officers and men off Rabaul, on her 3rd war patrol. While attacking a convoy, she torpedoed a Jap

destroyer who along with 2 other destroyers depth charged her. As she tried to surface, the






USS Swordfish (SS-193)

Lost on Jan 12,1945 with the loss of 89 officers and men somewhere near Okinawa, on her 13th war patrol. Probably was lost to a mine.





USS S-36 (SS-141)

Lost on Jan 20, 1942 with no loss of life, on her 2nd war patrol. She ran hard aground on a reef and radioed for help. The entire crew was rescued by a Dutch ship after they scuttled her.





USS S-26 (SS-131)

Lost on Jan 24,1942 with the loss of 46 officers and men in the Gulf of Panama, on her 2nd war patrol. She was rammed by the USS PC-460 and sunk within seconds. The CO, XO and one lookout on the bridge, were the only survivors.







VA Information

New California laws

More veterans can now obtain a CalVet Home loan at lower, more competitive interest rates. Disabled veterans' estates will have an easier time securing local property tax exemptions. And finally, deceased veterans can have an American flag with them when cremated.

CalVet's century-old Veterans Home
Loan Program got a legislative facelift
that will allow the program to better
serve a broader population of California
veterans. The changes also will allow CalVet Home Loans to offer more competitive market rates, which both increases
the veteran's buying power by lowering
monthly payments and helps to retain
existing veteran borrowers by allowing
them to refinance at rates closer to those
offered by private sector lenders.

Another new law allows the executor, administrator or other legal representative of a living veteran's estate, or a trustee of a deceased veteran's trust, to file for a disabled veterans property tax exemption with the county assessor.

And a U.S. military veteran can now be cremated with an American flag. The request to the crematorium must be made by the person or persons with the authority to dispose of the veteran's remains. The new law exempts the process from the United States Code, which otherwise dictates the protocol involving the retirement or disposal of an American flag.

I believe he is deserving of the USSVI Silver Anchor Award, and it is my hope that he will be chosen for this honor in 2021.







The Loss Of USS S-27 (SS-132)—But Not Her Crew

In March of 1917, the U.S. Navy authorized the construction of a new S-class submarine which was laid down two years later at the Bethlehem Shipbuilding Corporation in Quincy, MA. She was commissioned as USS S-27 (SS-132) on 22 January 1924. After stints in New London, San Diego, and Pearl Harbor, and an overhaul at Mare Island Naval Shipyard, she was sent to Alaska in May of 1942 to patrol the frigid northern waters in support of the war that America had only recently entered.

S-27 spent the first week of her first patrol prowling around Adak and Amchitka, two islands at the end of the Aleutian chain; on the night of 16 June, she was ordered to head to Kiska, which lies even further to the west. On the 18th she entered Amchitka's Constantine Harbor to check for Japanese; finding none, she made her way around the southern tip of the island. That night, before setting out for Kiska, she stopped to charge her batteries. But while she was doing so, currents or tides caused her to drift about five miles from where the crew, using dead reckoning, believed her position to be. Since the boat was enveloped in a thick fog, the drift went undetected. At 0000 on 19 June, she got underway once more, although on only one engine as the crew continued to charge batteries with the second. But at 0043, things started to go wrong when breaking waves were sighted just 75 feet ahead of the boat. The "back emergency" order was given, but to no avail. Just seconds later, S-27 ran aground.

USS S-27 (SS-132)

The situation did not improve as the night wore on. Waves continued to pound the boat, shoving her further onto the rocks and causing her to roll from side to side, up to fifteen degrees in either direction. The crew dumped their fuel in an attempt to lighten the sub and lift her off the rocks, but they only succeeded in making her rolls even more violent. To make matters worse, one of her propellers struck a rock and was rendered useless. The commanding officer next tried to move the boat forward, but she made it only twenty feet before grounding once more. At 0115, the first of six distress calls went out. Only one would actually be received, and it contained no location. S-27 and her men were on their own.

The weather worsened as dawn drew near, so the decision was made to move as many crewmembers as possible to shore. A pulley system was set up between the boat and the beach; a rubber raft hauled back and forth between the two carried men, weapons, and supplies to shore. Six Sailors, including the commanding officer, remained on board, destroying equipment and burning classified materials in case the Japanese later discovered the wreck. Three of the six went ashore at 1530, when the torpedo room began to flood. Just before 1600, the last three abandoned ship.

The crew spent the night on the beach without shelter, but the following day they moved to Constantine Harbor. There had been a village there be-

fore the Japanese bombed it and the Sailors were able to take advantage of several undamaged buildings and some heating equipment. In true military fashion, the men organized a watch bill of sentries and sent work parties back to the beach—and even onboard the wreck—to recover more supplies.

The organization of a camp proved, however, to be largely unnecessary. On 24 June, a PBY Catalina aircraft



conducting a routine surveillance flight discovered the camp and landed nearby. Fifteen men left on that first plane; three more arrived the next day to rescue the rest. Although the sub was lost, every man survived.

One of the US Navy's most powerful weapons makes a rare appear-

ance in Guam One of the most powerful weapons in the US Navy's arsenal made a rare port call in Guam over the weekend, sending a message to allies and foes amid increasing tensions in the Indo-Pacific, analysts said.

The USS Nevada, an Ohio-class nuclear-powered submarine carrying 20 Trident ballistic missiles and dozens of nuclear warheads, pulled into the Navy base in the US Pacific Island territory on Saturday. It's the first visit of a ballistic missile submarine -- sometimes called a "boomer" -- to Guam since

2016 and only the second announced visit since the 1980s.

"The port visit strengthens cooperation between the United States and allies in the region, demonstrating US capability, flexibility, readiness, and continuing commitment to Indo-Pacific regional security and stability," a US Navy statement said.



Movements of the 14 boomers in the US Navy's fleet are usually closely guarded secrets. Nuclear power means the vessels can operate submerged for months at a time, their endurance limited only by the supplies needed to sustain their crews of more than 150 sailors.

The Navy says Ohio-class submarines stay an average of 77 of days at sea before spending about a month in port for maintenance and replenishment.

It's rare for one to even be photographed outside their home ports of Bangor, Washington, and Kings Bay, Georgia. The secrecy surrounding the ballistic missile submarines makes them the "most important survivable leg of the nuclear triad," which also includes silo-based ballistic missiles on the US mainland and nuclear-capable bombers like the B-2 and B-52.

But with tensions brewing between the US and China over the status of the self-ruled island of Taiwan, and as North Korea ramps up missile tests, Washington can make a statement with its ballistic missile submarines that neither Beijing nor Pyongyang can, according to the analysts.

"It sends a message -- intended or not: we can park 100-odd nuclear warheads on your doorstep, and you won't even know it or be able to do much about it. And the reverse isn't true and won't be for a good while," said Thomas Shugart, a former US Navy submarine captain and now an analyst at the Center for a New American Security.

North Korea's ballistic submarine program is in its infancy, and China's estimated fleet of six ballistic missile submarines is dwarfed by the US Navy's.

And China's ballistic missile subs don't have the capabilities of the US boomers, according to a 2021 analysis by experts at the Center for Strategic and International Studies.

China's Type 094 ballistic missile subs are two times louder than the US subs, and therefore more easily detected, and carry fewer missiles and warheads, CSIS analysts wrote in August.

Besides the political signaling, the presence of the USS Nevada in the region presents another opportunity, said Alessio Patalano, professor of war and strategy at King's College in London.

"The presence of this type of boat -- especially in training and exercises -- adds an important opportunity to learn how to hunt those of other actors in the region," Patalano said.

"The DPRK (North Korea) is pursuing the development of such a type of a platform, and China already fields them. Homing in the skills to track them is as important as deploying them as strategic deterrent," he said.

The last time a US Navy boomer visited Guam was in 2016, when the USS Pennsylvania stopped there.

Analysts said tensions across the Indo-Pacific have significantly increased since that time, and more such military displays are likely from Washington in the current environment.

"This deployment reminds us that the nuclear order at sea in the (Indo-Pacific) matters, and whilst often outside wider public conversation, we are likely to see more of it in the development of regional strategic balance," Patalano said.
